






























"JOURNEYS"

The following story first appeared in <u>MOONSHOT The Indigenous</u> <u>Comics Collection Volume 2</u>, a project created to give indigenous authors opportunities to tell stories based on their own tribe or community's traditions.

Jeffrey Veregge was inspired by his Suquamish tradition—carried out to this day—of canoe journeys that bring the tribe's culture to new places as a gesture of sharing and respect.

The Suquamish text woven through the story is the lyrics of a traditional traveler song, and marks one of the first times the oral tradition has been written out. The story also, hopefully, is a reminder that we are all sharing lands, and can choose to do so respectfully.

"THE WHISPERER"

Joamette Gil—a queer Afro-Cuban cartoonist, editor, letterer, and publisher whose work has been recognized with Eisner and Prism awards—included this story in <u>Power & Magic: The Queer Witch Comics Anthology</u>, which she funded on Kickstarter in 2016. It received a <u>Lambda Literary Award</u> nomination the following year.

Kickstarter Android Staff Engineer and selection committee member Izzy Oji thought it was great, too—she likes "The Whisperer" in particular. "I thought it was a unique way of talking about mental health. It showed how different people experience their mental health issues differently and it showed how people with mental health issues can support each other."



"ANOTHER WORLD"

Chinese censors are notorious—traditional publishers and small upstarts alike face a frustrating game of cat-and-mouse that often makes it impossible to even reference politically sensitive topics.

That's what makes <u>Naked Body: An Anthology of</u> <u>Underground Chinese Comics</u> so daring. It's an assertion that the underground subculture is alive and well, or at least unrelenting. Nudity remains a focus for Chinese sensors, but these illustrators featured cheerful tales of normalized nakedness, as well as explicit, and, in some cases, explicitly queer sexuality.

Sadan's contribution, "Another World," deals with the aging body in terms of death and mortality—a more somber and wistful take on the birthday suit.


























"BREATH, PLUCKED FROM HEAVEN"

Here's another story that explores mortality and remembrance.

It first appeared in <u>ELEMENTS: Fire - A comics anthology by creators of color</u>, which went on to win an <u>Eisner Award</u> for <u>best anthology back in 2018</u>. The unifying prompt was, you guessed it, "fire," and the responses were speculative fiction ranging from sci-fi and fantasy to alternative cyberpunk, humor, and suspense.

"I love the quiet, meditative aspects of this story," says Kickstarter Comics Outreach Lead and selection committee member Camilla Zhang. "It's very rare to read a comic that has multiple layers of being and meaning, like poetry. Shivana doesn't do a lot of explaining in terms of who these characters are or were, but that's what makes it so intimate. Every time I re-read this story, I feel something new."








































































































































































































"THE FLOURISHING FEAST

The following story first appeared in *Heartwood: Non-binary* Tales of Sylvan Fantasy—you might remember publisher Joamette Gil from a few stories back. This breakout book claimed the title of the first-ever non-binary comics anthology, made entirely by cartoonists who identify as gender non-binary. Through tales of caution, adventure, rites of passage, and discovery, the creators explored the Forest as both setting and symbol, having their characters face the unknown and emerge transformed.

"The art style of this piece – particularly the way the artist uses black and white to create contrast and highlight parts of the story absolutely floored me the first time I saw it," says Kickstarter Senior Product Designer and selection committee member Cait Charniga. "Those striking visuals, paired with the way Juliette GMM Lopez dives into the whimsical and wonderful, yet daunting and mystifying, process of understanding your gender identity is what compelled me to highlight this story."






















"MIND & BODY"

<u>Anthology of Bodily Ailments</u>, a collection of comics about illness, both mental and physical, as well as healthcare experiences. From peanut allergies, losing an eye, depression, epilepsy, and what it is to care for a sick person, all the way to tackling the stigma of a chronic illness yourself, these stories covered a huge variety of personal, scary, hilarious, and poignant topics.

Mady G's bright, visual style deals with dysphoria in a comforting and validating way. Their vulnerability in wrestling with the variable layers of gender truth or gender reality encourages the reader to be OK with being undefined. It's OK to not have all the answers, it's OK to not be sure, and it's OK to not fit into any one box, especially when there is outside pressure to do so.
















"WASH DAY"


The following is an excerpt from <u>Wash Day</u>, a slice-of-life comic that pays tribute to the beauty and endurance of Black women and their hair. The story follows Kimana, a 26-year-old woman living in the Bronx, as she cares for her long, thick hair. As Kim goes through her Sunday morning rituals, we see the highs and lows of her day—fresh coffee, rising rent, girl talk, and catcalls.

"If you have really thick curly hair, you know what 'wash day' means," says Kickstarter Android Staff Engineer and selection committee member Izzy Oji. "This was a really fun slice-of-life comic that made me feel recognized, seen, and normalized. I like that Wash Day talks about how it's a whole process. I felt like it was a love letter to people with natural hair."








































"LA VOZ DE M.A.Y.O. TATA RAMBO"

The following is an excerpt from <u>La Voz De M.A.Y.O. Tata</u>
<u>Rambo #1</u> which tells the true story of Ramon Jaurigue, an orphan and World War II veteran who cofounded the Mexican, American, Yaqui, and Others (M.A.Y.O.) organization. Among their achievements were the successful lobby against the Tucson City Council to improve living and working conditions for members of the local Pascua Yaqui tribe and the official recognition of the Pascua Yaqui tribe from the U.S. government.

Utilizing newspaper clippings, interviews with surviving M.A.Y.O. members, and Ramon's authored articles, *La Voz De M.A.Y.O.* dramatizes the remarkable life and achievements of author Henry Barajas' great-grandfather—and in so doing, tells the story not just of a single man, but of a family, a tribe, and a nation.
































































































"SINGULAR THEY"

The following story first appeared in <u>We're Still Here: An All-Trans Comics Anthology</u>, a project that creator Tara Avery believes to be the first anthology of comics entirely by and for transgender creators.

Ranging from fiction to nonfiction, escapist fantasy to slice-of-life memoir and back again, the anthology covered the weird and uncomfortable, highlighted little-known kinks and contradictions in the trans experience, and most importantly, told stories about trans people having a good time. It was nominated for a <u>Lambda Literary Award</u> in 2018.

"As a non-binary person who uses they/them pronouns, I am often presented with arguments and grumblings against the use of 'they' as a singular use pronoun," says Kickstarter Senior Product Designer and selection committee member Cait Charniga. "I love this comic because it shows how singular they is certainly not new while giving a light-hearted history lesson around its usage."

Afterword

In 2015, a year into graduate school and one volume into my webcomic *Check, Please!*, I remember walking down to the Savannah River, down along Bay Street, to look at the open green water. This was my attempt to calm myself down—to think about how much water there is and how small I was. I was nervous out of my mind because my Kickstarter for *Check, Please!: Year One* was launching in less than 24 hours.

The stakes were high. If this Kickstarter did well, that meant that I could not only give *Check, Please*'s burgeoning readership something concrete—a physical embodiment of the enthusiasm they had given the comic for over two years—but it also meant that I had a chance to make comics for a living. To be a self-sustained cartoonist! And as one of those seven-story freight boats that traffics the Savannah River crept on by, and indeed, made me feel very small, I prayed for this opportunity. One project. One book. One Kickstarter.

In a world where artists from all walks of life are creating comics that capture every odd and beautiful shade of the human experience, few comics get the opportunity to be elevated, broadcast, and distributed on a large scale. Those who hold the key to the gates are people who are unfortunately too hesitant, uninformed, or risk-averse to tamper with the status quo. The power of self-publishing, and indeed, the power of Kickstarter, is that the gates get blown off their hatches. When your audience rallies behind you

to bring a graphic novel to print, suddenly you have the keys in your hands.

Sitting on my bookshelf right now are books that I got from big retail stores, but tucked in right next to them are graphic novels that were hand-packaged and hand-mailed to me by creators whose Kickstarter projects I backed. I have Kickstarted zines that I would have only been able to find at the most independent of indie zine festivals. I have posters and T-shirts and keychains from stories that only me and 2,000 other people know about, but we loved this story so dang much that we handed the creator money to help their—our—vision come true. We're in a new age, people!

After my wistful river-gazing, I'm grateful to say that the *Check, Please!: Year One* Kickstarter was funded the next day. Just think: if there had been no platform to self-publish my comic, there would never have been any wishes placed on rivers, no hopes that I could build my comics career with my bare hands and the help of 1,000 readers. My comic's fate would have been in the hands of others who might not have understood it, or might not have put it in a place where it could thrive. After reading this book, and after experiencing these comics that got their start on Kickstarter, I hope that the potential is palpable to you. Each creator holds their own keys. With Kickstarter, these are stories that are getting to be told.
